





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
Year 4 had fun this week planning a Viking winter feast! We worked to a budget and used multiplication, addition and subtraction to see if we had reached our budget.




















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Pankhurst have had some excellent discussions about forces and gravity, discussed variables, made predictions and then tested them.



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Ice Safety Message from Warwickshire Fire & Rescue Service

Following the tragic incident in Solihull where four children fell through ice on a lake, Warwickshire Fire & Rescue Service (WFRS) would like to reiterate some key safety messages for spending time near water in icy conditions.

This article - https://bit.ly/ice-safety-wfrs - details the advice from WFRS for avoiding incidents, as well as what to do if something goes wrong.

Please don't try to walk or skate on frozen water. Regardless of how solid it looks, you never know when the ice may give way, in which instance tragic outcomes are common.

If you or someone else gets into difficulty, remember to float to live.

- Keep calm and shout for help
- Spread your arms across the surface of the ice in front of you
- If the ice is strong enough, kick your legs to slide onto the ice
- Lie flat and pull yourself towards the bank
- If the ice breaks, work your way to the bank by breaking the ice in front of you
- If you cannot climb out, wait for help and keep as still as possible, pressing your arms by your side, keeping your legs together and keeping your head clear of the water

Once you are safe, go to hospital immediately for a check up

Mr Fortune & Mrs Radcliffe will be doing short presentations for Upper School and Lower School respectively.




